Happy Birthday Robert McCloskey

Robert McCloskey will turn 100 years old in September and events celebrating his accomplishments are planned throughout the year.

A series of adult book discussions featuring *Make Way for McCloskey: A Robert McCloskey Treasury* will be held at the Hamilton Lane Library on March 5, the Fairfield Lane Library on March 10 and the Oxford Lane Library on March 18 at 6:30 p.m. The first 15 people at each discussion will receive a copy of the book. This series is sponsored by the Lane Libraries and the Michael J. Colligan History Project.

A two month-long exhibit of McCloskey's sketches and original prints from *Yankee Doodle's Cousin* by Anne Malcolmson will open at the Fitton Center for Creative Arts in March. On Saturday, March 15, *Family Arts Day* at the Fitton Center for Creative Arts will feature Gratia Banta in the McCloskey exhibit from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m.

Saturday, March 22 from 10:00 a.m. to noon will feature *Make Way for McCloskey: A Children's Walk for All Ages* at the Hamilton Lane Library. Walk in the footsteps of Robert McCloskey with a parade from the library to Heritage Hall, the site of the Robert McCloskey museum, touring McCloskey landmarks along the way. Blueberries For Sal, Story Time, ages 4-7 will be at the Fairfield Lane Library on Saturday, April 12 at 10:30 a.m. Children will be able to create blueberry crafts and enjoy yummy snacks.

Marcus, a leading children's book historian, author and critic will speak on *American Dreamer: Robert McCloskey and the Art of the Picture Book* at the Wilks Conference Center, Miami University Hamilton on Wednesday, April 16 at 7:30 p.m. This talk is sponsored by the Michael J. Colligan History Project and the Lane Libraries.

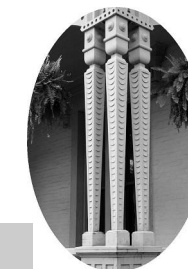

Upcoming BCHS Programming

We have three special programs planned for this spring that you will want to be sure to attend.

Steven M. Nolt, professor of history at Goshen College, Indiana, and author of several well-acclaimed books about the Amish, including the 2013 publication, *The Amish*, the companion to the PBS American Experience program on the Amish, will speak in Hamilton on Saturday, March 29, 2014 at 11:00 a.m. at the Butler County Historical Society's Emma Ritchie Auditorium.

This program is offered through the collaboration of the Butler County Historical Society, MetroParks of Butler County, and the Friends of Christolm and is free and open to all. This will be a wonderful opportunity to learn more about the Amish and in particular the now-extinct Amish settlement of Butler County.

On Wednesday, April 30, at 7:00 p.m., you will have the opportunity to learn about our early history through the eyes of Robert McClellan, when George McClellan talks on *Perilous Paths, Butler County's Role in the Westward Expansion*. The McClellans were early settlers in Hamilton and the talk will focus on life in the United States in the early 1800s.

On Thursday, May 8, Jim Blount will present *Let's Go to the Movies: Hamilton's Theaters from Silent to Sound*. This talk will be at 7:00 p.m. and plan on coming early to view the BCHS exhibit *The Theaters of Butler County*.

All three of these events will be in the Emma Ritchie Auditorium and are free and open to the public.



Theater Exhibit Now Open

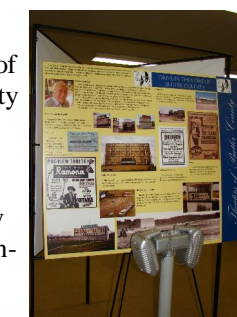

Dayton Lane Promenade

The biennial Dayton Lane Promenade occurs on Sunday, May 18, 2013 from 1-5 p.m. in Hamilton's Dayton-Campbell historic district. The May Promenade is a step back in time to the early 1900s when Hamilton's industrial barons built their grand homes along Dayton Street and Campbell Avenue. Ten renovated historic homes will be open for tours and period demonstrations will be held in the Campbell Avenue Park. You can also take a ride on a horse drawn trolley and see high wheel bicycles with costumed wheelmen. Presale tickets can be purchased at Vision Source, 712 Dayton Street, or on line at www.historicdaytonlane.org for \$15 per person. Tickets purchased the date of the Promenade are \$20 per person. Tickets can be picked up at one of the Promenade's locations the day of the event at the Wolfe Gazebo, 900 Block of Campbell Avenue, or outside of Dayton Lane Gardens, 600 Block of Dayton Lane.

We Have Interns!

BCHS has three interns working with us for the spring semester. Sarah Turner, a Masters candidate from Kent State is working with our family files in an attempt to make them more user friendly. She is going through each file, copying material that is in danger of disappearing, copying material that pertains to more than one surname and cross filing that material, creating family files where needed, and removing photographs and other family memorabilia that have been stored in the family file and moving it to individual family boxes where the material is less likely to be damaged. There are over 16 file drawers worth of material, and numerous boxes that contain family material. Once done, everything will be cross-referenced and notes placed into the family files as to the location of other family material.

Mallory Hellenthal and Michelle McVey are working with BCHS Vice President Sara Butler to catalog, organize and properly store BCHS's huge collection of textiles. Our current textile collection is spread out throughout the house and the auditorium, with much of it packed in drawers, trunks or non-archival boxes. Mallory will be working with the organization and proper storage of the collection, while Michelle will develop a clothing exhibit for both the theater exhibit and exhibits throughout the upstairs of the Benninghofen House. They have already discovered some exciting pieces and are anxious to get them on display. Several grants have also been written in hopes of obtaining much needed material to complete this project.

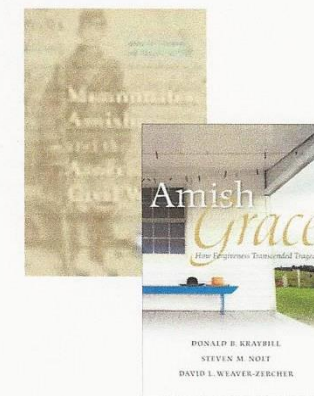

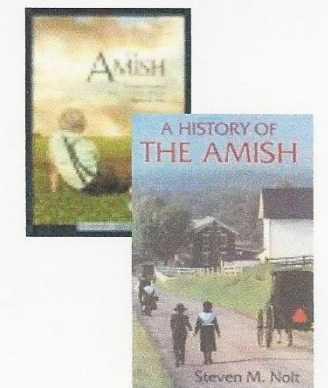

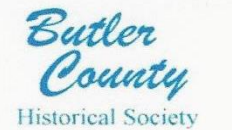
