

2021 Annual Report

When 2021 started, we had no idea what would happen with Covid-19 still threatening. Do we plan for virtual or live events? Will we be able to be open for tours and research?

The decision was made to proceed with normal programming but adapted for both virtual and live presentations. With this in mind, we resumed our popular "Members Only" events and offered six programs with both virtual and live options. Topics included: the Spanish Flu; George W. White; the history of various annual holidays; the 19th Amendment; Decoration/Memorial Day postcard presentation; and Victorian funeral traditions.

Changing exhibits continued to be part of our programming. Two large exhibits, Summer Fun in Butler County and Funeral and 1800s Medical Practices were featured in the Benninghofen House. Two art exhibits featuring George W. White and Robert McCloskey were located in the Emma Ritchie Auditorium. Following the George W. White exhibit, three paintings were sent to Wiebold's in Cincinnati for restoration work. The paintings are due back in early 2022.


Attendance was down for the multi-generational programs. There were several contributing factors besides Covid-19. The weather was a problem, with extreme heat for one program and heavy rain for another. A 5-K race through German Village that closed the roads didn't help a third program!

Those that did attend had a great time.

In August, we invited teachers from throughout the county to an open house at BCHS. We suggested topics and programs that could be presented to their students through the Speaker's Bureau, along with showing them the opportunities for field trips. As a result, our school outreach programming expanded. Programs were presented to the Lakota, Ross and Talawanda School districts, along with numerous homeschooling groups. Popular topics were Native Americans of the Miami Valley and What is it and How Does it Work?

The Speaker's Bureau resumed on a live basis in the fall, with Westover and the Waterford Retirement facilities. Several programs were also presented at Miami Hamilton Downtown and several civic and social organizations.

Several special events were held. An arbor was installed and dedicated in honor of Master Gardener Karen Kessler and her husband, Mel, for all of their dedication and service to BCHS. The Butler County Fair resumed, and we had over 2000 people stop by the booth to learn



about our mystery items. The Hamilton Joes Baseball Team held BCHS Night at a game which was a lot of fun. We finished out the year with two ghost hunts, which continued to be very popular.

Work continued on the restoration of the 35th Ohio Volunteer Infantry Flag project and the development of a special exhibit to welcome the flag home. The flag should be finished by mid to late summer 2022. Speaking of the military, BCHS undertook a major project to document all veterans from Butler County. Once completed, the list will be available at a special kiosk at the Soldiers, Sailors and Pioneers Monument, as well as on line. As the close of 2021, research on WW I was completed. The War of 1812, Korean and Spanish American Wars were close to being done. WW II, Vietnam and conflicts since Vietnam are underway and will hopefully be completed in 2022. Through our research, we have discovered that the listing of the veterans on the Monument walls are incomplete and work has begun on updating the names of Revolutionary War, Mexican-American and Civil War veterans. As part of

the research for the 35th OVI exhibit, that Civil War unit has been completed.

2021 was a year for maintenance problems. We replaced the heating and air conditioning unit for the basement of the auditorium, as well as the units for the Benninghofen House. The auditorium also got a new roof, and an animal barrier was installed under the corner of the Benninghofen House that had become home to neighborhood skunks, raccoons and opossums.

The Annual Dinner meeting was held in the Emma Ritchie Auditorium in November after last minute Covid restrictions required a change in venue. Rick Fornshell was honored as Volunteer of the Year. The program was a rousing game of Liar's Club Round 3.





The Christmas Walk was held, but changed to an outside only event. We still hosted Santa Claus, but he was located on the front porch. Crowd estimates were over 1000 people for the event.

Two grants were received during the year. The one from the Michael J. Colligan History Project paid for half of the flag restoration project, and the W.E. Smith Family Trust provided shelving for the garage, upgraded computer equipment and programming expenses.

We continued to staff the Soldiers, Sailors and Pioneers Monument and attendance figures were steady throughout the year. A Vietnam exhibit was opened.

The BCHS would like to extend a big thank you to all of our volunteers. We have a wonderful group that comes in on a regular basis to help with day to day tasks such as research, putting up displays, giving tours, sorting the files, and much more. We couldn't be as successful without their generosity of time. If you are interested in becoming a volunteer, please reach out!

Negotiations to assume the operation of Heritage Hall progressed through the year, with BCHS assuming responsibility effective January 1, 2022. Heritage Hall was open on a limited basis but did have two very successful projects. In May, in cooperation with the Lane Public Library and BCHS, they participated in the two day Make Way for McCloskey Walk where participation exceeded expectations. They also produced a Robert McCloskey Coloring Book.

Despite another pandemic year, the BCHS was able to continue with popular programming for the community and maintain a regular schedule of research, Benninghofen House maintenance, and daily historical society responsibilities.

Vintage Valentines now on display at the BCHS



For the One I Love

During the Victorian era, the valentine evolved from a handmade card, to a ready-made, elaborately decorated card purchased from a printer or stationer. 'Valentine Writer' books contained poems and verses that could be hand written onto the plain valentine for a special touch. Ornamental, lacy, embossed valentines were popular from 1850 - 1915. Printed verses and trimmings such as ribbons, fringe and fabric added embellishments so favored in Victorian times. The pulldown valentine (pictured) consisted of three layers and created a three-dimensional effect which surely charmed the recipient. Honeycomb paper added further dimension to the pulldown valentines of the early 20th century and these cleverly designed cards were aimed at children rather than grownups. The postcard craze of the late 1800s - early 1900s inspired a fad for valentine postcards. They were mass produced and affordable for the average person to send messages of love and affection. Although styles have changed, romance and affection continue and valentine cards are a perfect way to express fondness and romance.
